<p>The aim of the session will be to explore some of the basic concepts of domestic abuse and gender violence more broadly. We will consider when women are at highest risk, what social workers (and other professional) can do to support women, and the complex feelings and emotions that are often involved in domestic abuse cases.</p>		
<p>There will be a focus on domestic abuse in the context of Children and Families social work. The session will also look at some current research, as well as the facilitator's own research, about the challenges faced by both the social worker and the women, and the concept of blame and stigma.</p>
