

The North-East London Partnership - Social Work PQ Offer

The Advanced Practice programme is made up of a range of optional modules which allow you to tailor the programme to meet your CPD needs and career aspirations. The modules can be taken as stand-alone modules with individual academic assessment. You can also build up awards by undertaking multiple modules.

Module credits range from 15 – 60 credits at Level 7 (MA level). It is possible to 'exit' the programme with a Post Graduate Certificate (60 academic credits), Post Graduate Diploma (120 academic credits) or an MSc (180 academic credits) in Advanced Practice. In order to achieve the MSc in Advanced Practice you must complete the Research Methods & Dissertation module which forms the final year of your studies and carries 60 academic credits.

The North East London Social Work Development Partnership Local Authorities, have worked with HEIs in London to provide a comprehensive Post Qualification offer for social workers across North East London. The aim is to develop more modules each year in response to need, providing opportunities for modules to be built into bespoke 'exit' awards, led by interest and developing expertise. Modules can be 'mixed and matched' to provide maximum choice and opportunities for subject specialism. The list of modules in this brochure is not exhaustive of what is on offer from HEIs. If you have a specific area of interest not covered please look at individual HEI websites and apply for funding using your employing Local Authority local procedures.



Post Graduate Study - Preparedness Checklist

If you are considering embarking on a post graduate programme i.e. Masters level study (either a single module or full PG Certificate, Diploma or MSc), or you are supporting a member of staff to do so, then you are advised to consider how you have prepared for the demands of study at this level, combined with work and personal commitments.

In academic terms Masters level study will involve:

- The need for independent study. At Masters level, academic staff offer less direct guidance than at Undergraduate level. Lectures, seminars and tutorials will be offered, highlighting core themes and debates however students are expected to fill gaps through reading and collaboration with fellow students. Considerable self-directed learning, including reading, is required via access to online resources, library resources and wider research.
- Breadth and depth in critical analysis of areas of study including key debates, issues and aspects of professional practice.
- Written and presentation skills of a high calibre. Attention to detail and rigour in relation to these areas is essential.

The programme staff, your tutors and academic skills support staff will provide assistance to help you achieve the required academic level but you will need to ensure that you are able to commit your time to this also. We are mindful that post-qualifying students are in employment with a varied range of work and personal commitments. We would therefore suggest that you reflect on the following:

Questions to consider:	Notes:
If there has been a recent period of study, what was the outcome?	
E.g. Consolidation. If you achieved a grade in the lower range then yo should consider how you have acted on the feedback provided to improve your future assignments. Are you able to commit the time a energy needed to do so?	
Are written and verbal communication skills sufficiently sound to provide a basis for post-graduate study? Consider the quality of formal reports and records (spelling, grammal construction and presentation of ideas), plus verbal presentation skill e.g. at formal meetings.	
Are you self-reliant and able to study independently? How willing are you to spend time sourcing and reading literature beyond core reading lists?	
Is your experience of study largely as a full time student? To what degree were working, family or other commitments an impact then? How have your commitments changed since your last period of study How will this impact on your ability to undertake new study? How have you planned to make time for independent study? Are you able to ring-fence dedicated time?	13

Module Description

The Consolidation module is usually the first post-qualifying module which candidates complete following their ASYE, and the programme allows candidates to utilise materials from their ASYE and reduces the number of workshops candidates need to attend in order to complete the module and achieve academic credits.

For social workers who have not completed the ASYE, the module will assist candidates to prepare for further study, particularly if they have not undertaken academic work for some time or wish to refresh their skills and update reading of current literature.

Candidates who already hold PQ1 will not normally need to undertake the Consolidation Module

Course Content

By the end of the module participants will have covered:

- the relationship between personal and professional values
- values in practice and the management of ethical dilemmas
- critical application of knowledge including theoretical frameworks and research
- decision making & critical case analysis

This is a 3 or 4-day module consisting of workshops and related seminars. Each seminar group has an allocated tutor who will support candidates with the assignment tasks. The programme will run twice during the academic year 2021/22.

Children with Harmful Sexual Behaviours

Module Title	Children with Harmful Sexual Behaviours (in Association with the NSPCC)

Module Description

This 4 day module will be delivered by specialist social workers from the NSPCC National Clinical Assessment and Treatment team (NCATS). The course is relevant for any social work or other child welfare professional working with vulnerable children and young people.

Candidates can complete this course as a standalone module or as part of a full academic award, a Postgraduate Certificate, Diploma or MSc in Advanced Practice. It is also possible to complete this course for continuing professional development purposes only. This module carries: 20 credits at Level 7.

Learning Outcomes

- Current research and clinical understanding of harmful sexual behaviour in children and young people.
- Models of assessment and treatment that incorporate an understanding of static and dynamic risk and resilience factors.
- Skills in effective communication, assessment and interventions with children with harmful sexual behaviours and their families.
- Critical examination of feelings, decisions and actions of individual professionals and on agency and interagency dynamics.

Module Description

Are you supervising social work, health or social care staff?

- Would you like the opportunity to critically reflect on your supervisory practice?
- Would you like to develop your ability to provide reflective supervision?
- Would you like to develop your skills in providing constructive developmental feedback to supervisees?
- Would you like to update your knowledge of current developments in policy, research and models related to supervision?

Then this Masters level module in Supervision of Professional Practice could be for you! You can complete this course as a stand-alone module, or as part of a full academic award, a Post Graduate Certificate, Diploma or Masters in Advanced Practice.

Course Content

- Social work supervision in context: including LGA standards for employers, Knowledge and Skills statements for Practice Supervisors and current research.
- Critical review of own experiences of supervision and supervisory style
- Models and tools for reflective supervision
- Power, emotion and anxiety in supervision
- Communication techniques: responses in supervision, questioning and feedback techniques.
- Evaluating and managing individual performance including identifying performance concerns, holistic assessment and holding difficult conversations

The module will include a half day skills development workshop with the Futures Theatre Company.

<u> Assessment</u>

Assessment of the course is via a portfolio which includes:

- A DVD/video recording of 30 minutes of a supervision session
- A 2500 word critical analysis of the candidate's role and practice in the recorded supervision session.
- Line manager verification of the authenticity of the video recording and confirmation of permission from supervisee to being recorded.

Supporting & Assessing Continuing Professional Development

Module Description

This module is designed to enable participants to further develop their knowledge and skills in supporting and assessing social workers. This might include support and assessment of NQSW's or more experienced staff, to support trainee practice educators or the delivery of training. Students will evidence their ability to support and assess CPD in line with relevant professional requirements.

The module is delivered through a flexible distance learning route and draws on participant's direct experience of facilitating and assessing learning & development. The module would be a suitable option for those focussing on leadership and management and/or wishing to specialise in professional education and complements both the Supervision of Professional Practice and PEPS modules.

In order to meet the requirements of the module and the assessment task candidates will need to:

- Currently or previously have held responsibility for supporting and assessing social workers undertaking post-qualifying professional development and learning through a flexible distance learning route
- Be able to provide direct practice evidence & verification of this work.

Course Content

The module will be delivered primarily on a distance learning basis. This will provide a flexible study option for candidates. Seminars and individual tutorials are offered to support candidates to evidence the learning outcomes and to utilise the distance learning material effectively. Typical content includes:

- Action learning techniques to support students in evidencing the PDE outcomes.
- Policy, organisational and professional context of post-qualifying professional development and learning
- Values, ethics and power in the learning relationship
- The role, skills & knowledge of the learning facilitator (mentor, coach, assessor, trainer)
- Assessment, quality assurance & evaluation

Module Description

This module supports candidates to develop project management skills in their specialist area of professional practice. It provides the opportunity to be supported to evaluate, review and potentially redesign or innovate elements of the service or team, thus providing both individual and organisational benefits.

Are you interested in:

- Evaluating an aspect of service delivery?
- Developing and implementing a service or team innovation?
- Reviewing and revising a policy document or practice guide?
- Designing & undertaking a plan of work-based learning or training?

Course Content

- Core principles of project management
- Theoretical frameworks for leadership and practice innovation
- Evaluation methods
- The legal, theoretical, professional and organisational context for service delivery and quality assurance
- Identification and application of research
- Current issues and debates in specialist practice areas

Candidates will: Plan, implement & evaluate a small-scale project in their chosen area of expertise For example:

- Evaluate aspects of service delivery
- ◆ Design and undertake a plan of work-based learning or training (e.g. introduce group reflective supervision)
- Review and update a policy document or practice guide
- ♦ Plan and implement a team or service innovation
- Developing your own and others expertise in an area of practice (e.g. restorative practice, making safeguarding personal)

Candidates will need to negotiate and draw up a project plan with the module tutor in the initial stages of the course. The project plan must be agreed before the candidate then proceeds with the module in full.

Description of Assessment

Assessment of the course is via a 30-minute presentation of the project and a 3000-word critical analysis of the project.

Module Description

Our combined practitioner education programme modules (PEPs 1 and 2) are designed for experienced social workers and aim to:

- Transfer your knowledge and skills of social work practice to practice education
- Develop your understanding of the principles of adult learning, supervision processes, methods of assessment planning and decision making
- help you reflect critically on supervision and teaching techniques

You will be allocated a practice assessor who will provide verbal and written feedback on your performance when practice teaching a student. You will also be given formative feedback on your assessed university assignments prior to summative assessment. You must be able to offer practice learning opportunities that are appropriate to London Metropolitan University social work students, be a registered social worker with at least three years' experience post-qualification and currently work in a social care setting

Course Content

- Understanding learning and teaching in higher education from a range of theoretical frameworks, identifying and meeting workforce development needs, and understanding research methods
- Supervising a social work student against the Professional Capability Framework (PCF) (The College of Social Work, 2012) for 70 or 100 days
- Participating in interviews of potential candidates for entry on to our undergraduate and postgraduate social work courses
- Offering live supervision to current students with two-way feedback
- · delivering teaching sessions on reflective practice and reflective writing
- Role-playing case scenarios from practice, with students' participation

Module Description

Practice Education Stage 1 & 2 module is part of the post qualifying Social Work provision at UEL. Our courses are for qualified social workers who want to supervise and assess students qualifying for their BA (Hons) Social Work or MA Social Work programmes. In line with current standards, the module is based around the Practice Educator Professional Standards (PEPs).

Eligibility Criteria for applications:

- Social work qualification and Social Work England registration
- At least two years post qualifying experience at the point of application

Teaching and Learning:

 The course is an 8-day taught course, including classroom teaching and online learning.

Trainee practice educators are also required to attend and participate in one of the following:

- BA or MA Readiness to Practice teaching, student assessed role plays
- One Practice Assessment Panel (PAP) meeting in either February, March, or May 2022
- This requires a time commitment of half a day inclusive of preparation.

Employer Requirements

- To host a final year placement for 100 days for a BA or MA UEL student
- To provide a Practice Assessor for the trainee practice educator. The Practice
 Assessor must observe the trainee practice educator a minimum of twice supervising, teaching and assessing the social work student in accordance with the
 PEPs domains A-D.

Assessment

The module assessment consists of two portfolios, one submitted at the end of November 2021 and one at the beginning of June 2022. The final portfolio must include evidence in the practice assessor reports to demonstrate that the trainee practice educator has met the PEPs domains.
